#### SHARON DELL - Vale 20 December 2021

A happy gathering of friends and well-wishers attended the event to celebrate the farewell to Sharon Dell, Hocken Librarian since 2008. Under difficult Covid restrictions the farewell gathering of about 100 met in the early evening of Monday 20 December. The gathering showed the great affection and respect held for Sharon who had been 'brought' to Dunedin by an escort of colleagues from her former employment at Whanganui Museum. She was recognised there as a taonga or treasure, and would soon after arrival in

Dunedin be realised in a similar way. She remained at the Hocken 13 and a half years. Appropriate and beautiful waiata from Hocken staff punctuated the presentations.



And what years they have been, full of adventure and change. Judith Holloway commented in her speech about the immediate impact that Sharon had on the staff with "warmth, positivity, approachability and ability" – even in her first informal meeting.

During Sharon's tenure the challenges of inadequate funding, pressure on space, and crises of direction were addressed. During Sharon's tenure, more staff (now 30 EFTS) were been appointed. Directions of University and community outreach, including a "meaningful, respectful relationship with tangata whenua" have developed.

Clare de Lore, (Lady McKinnon), a journalist writing for the New Zealand *Listener*, in late April 2017 drafted an insightful article on Sharon. She wrote under the heading 'Our home was always full of books': The woman in charge of the Hocken Collections derives enormous pleasure from the treasures in her professional care — and those in her own home. And there we have a close pointer to the central motive for Sharon's career, ending with the Hocken.

It seemed from reading Clare de Lore's exposé that Sharon was predisposed from birth to be an archivist or librarian. Her father Dick Dell was Director of the Dominion Museum, a place which she described as "like a second home" and her mother, Dame Miriam Dell, a teacher and advocate of women's rights. Childhood to university, the father's study provided the nest for Sharon and her sisters. Sharon was deeply immersed in archive collections before arriving in Dunedin being more than 20 years at the Alexander Turnbull Library in Wellington, followed by 12 years at Whanganui Regional Museum.

Her background and skills made her involvement with manuscripts more intense. She gained an abiding interest in the preservation of precious materials "You have to look after things so that they last." For her, books and the research they provide are more than the meat and bones of her archive work – they join the archival and interest objects with connection to their authors, painters, sculptors and ceramicists.

De Lore asked Sharon to expand on the utilisation of the Hocken Collections to academics and those who access the collections. She responded with "Democratising of research" part of which was the digitising of a portion of the Samuel Marsden archives, dealing with letters and journals of the first missionaries to the Bay of Islands in the 1808 - 1820s. Well-known collections include the material from Colin McCahon from which the 1948 painting The Virgin and Child Compared is Sharon's favourite.

Her home reflects her profession and her interests with a multitude of books, tea cosies, jugs and textiles. For her the past is the present. Her legacy for the Hocken has been an enduring passion, a sense for what is right, whether it be adequate funding and resources, more space, or a clearer understanding of what the Hocken and its staff are, and their important functions in this community. Her office mantra "People activate collections" directed her mahi.

Sharon Dell – two thoughts for you –He toka tū moana – a stalwart, a rock standing steadfast in the ocean;

Tohaina ō painga ki te ao, - you share your gifts with the world

There is much, much more which could and should be written about the splendid career of ex-Hocken Librarian Sharon Dell but time and space dictate brevity. We wish you well, Sharon. George Davis with assistance from Judith Holloway Team Leader,

### The Friends of the Hocken Collections Award 2023

To mark the occasion of its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2016, the Friends of the Hocken Collections offered an award of NZ\$10,000 to support a research project on some aspect of the historical development of culture and society in Aotearoa/New Zealand, primarily using the resources of the Hocken Collections. Joint winners of the anniversary Award were Laurence Fearnley and Paul Hersey. *To the Mountains: A Collection of NZ Alpine Writing* was the very pleasing result. Jonathan West won the subsequent Award for work (carried out in 2020-21) towards his proposed publication Mirrors *on the Land; Histories of New Zealand's Lakes*.

The two Award competitions have attracted a wide range of applications for several eminently fundable projects in which the Hocken Collections' resources were of vital or key importance. The Friends' executive committee resolved in principle, therefore, to continue to offer The Friends of the Hocken Collections Award in 2023 with unchanged criteria.

The intended outcomes of the Award are creatively open for the project applicants to develop and propose. Both collaborative and singular applications are welcome, and salient aspects such as medium, genre, scope, and purpose are prescription-free.

The application Closing Date for an award to be held in the calendar year 2023 is 15 **October 2022**. (Application documentation will be available on the Friends of the Hocken Collections website –

https://hockenfriends.org.nz/ – from 1 July. Applicants will be advised of the competition result by **30 November 2022**.
